Pilot aim	To make it easier for residents in communal properties across Surrey to recycle small electricals and, in some areas, household batteries.
Outcome	7 tonnes of small electricals were collected from communal properties.



Collection approach

The Surrey Environment
Partnership placed 80-litre bins at
communal buildings so that
residents could recycle small
electricals. Most bins had battery
collectors attached.

The bins were collected fortnightly by contractors using dedicated vehicles.

The most commonly recycled items were kettles, toasters, mobile phones, MP3 players, headphones, and hairdryers. Contamination was generally low.

Communications approach

Residents were told in advance how to use the service and what they could recycle.

The pilot focused on using targeted printed materials, including:

- Letters sent to residents 1 month before the roll out of the service
- Leaflets and stickers included alongside bins to reinforce messaging
- "Thank You" cards sent around three months after rollout, featuring HypnoCat to encourage continued participation

Future plans

Surrey continued to trial collections from flats with a second round of Material Focus funding, granted in 2023.
